God's Love is Not "Either/Or"

Binary opposition is one of the powerful storytelling features of myths from oral cultures. Many of the great stories of the Hebrew Scriptures have binary elements. The Genesis 25 story of Esau and Jacob is no exception. Consider the contrasting elements in verses 23–28. They establish the tension in the brothers' relationship, beginning with the fact they are twins, but non-identical:

> stronger older red (a dark colour) Hairy letting go, pulling away manly (skillful hunter, of the field) loved by father

weaker younger a lighter, contrasting colour (implied) smooth (implied) holding on, pulling down womanly (quiet, living in tents, cooking) loved by mother

Humans are prone to binary or dualistic thinking. We think in terms of day or night, right or wrong, tall or short, masculine or feminine, able-bodied or disabled, black or white. Young children are "naughty or nice." What parents haven't compared their children or their grandchildren in "either/or" terms? Vivid contrasts of appearance, character, and behaviour not only engage a story's audience, but also help us maneuver daily through a world that might otherwise be complex and demanding. But, acting on such rigid thinking can obscure real life and the range of possibilities between the opposite extremes.

When the identities of people and cultures are described in binary terms, power imbalances have followed. Think of the common pairing of doctor and patient, teacher and learner, or social service worker and client. In each binary, one person is considered capable, competent, knowledgeable, authoritative; and "the other" is not. As certain status and privileges are associated with the one, "the other" can experience the loss of status and disempowerment. This has commonly happened with respect to people of different race, ethnic origins, and culture.

Palestinian-American professor Edward Said articulated a theory of "othering" in his book *Orientalism* (Routledge & Kegan Paul, 1978). This theory explains how things Western or European are associated with superiority, demeaning all other people and cultures, creating tension between peoples and breakdown in relationships. For example, the binary world view in Canada in the 1900s led to the residential schools system for Aboriginal peoples. Everything Aboriginal – language, culture, ways of knowing, music, spirituality – was deemed inferior to the dominant European culture. Colonization and imperialism have followed "othering" throughout the world and continue in the 21st century. In the aftermath of the September 11, 2001 tragedy, binary thinking plainly affected people's way of identifying themselves in relationship to others who were racially and ethnically different.

In the Genesis 25 story, the binary elements create a tension between the two brothers that leads to the breakdown in their relationship. The longing for the privileges of the first-born drives Jacob cleverly to take advantage of Esau to obtain the birthright and, later in Genesis 28, Isaac's blessing. The dualism in this story contrasts with the reading of the Parable of the Sower (Matthew 13:3–9). Indeed, Franciscan priest, Richard Rohr believes that Jesus was the first non-dual religious teacher of the West. Jesus' parables and teachings often defy binary opposition; they not only obscure easy, unanimous interpretation, but instead they create confusion and ambiguity.

Perhaps the greatest challenge underlying Jesus' parables is to go beyond binary thinking to create new relationships in new ways, relationships where we respect and value each other no matter how different our appearances, behaviours, life situations; rather than treating people as "the other." Rohr believes this is his challenge: I've looked at the patterns of my life and when I surrender to that simplistic, either-or, all or nothing thinking, it's made me make my worst mistakes. It's allowed me to hurt people unnecessarily without even knowing I was hurting them. It has allowed me to not be compassionate, to not be patient, to not be merciful, to not understand situations, to read them wrong. The dualistic mind operates by reading everything by what I like and by what I prefer. It reads everything egocentric. From "Tapestry," CBC Radio, Monday, September 20, 2009. There is no easy "either/or" in relationship-building or reconciling with others in God's realm. As in the Parable of the Sower, real-life relationships span a range of situations, all of them falling within God's creation and love.

For Your Reflection: Read Rohr's words again.

- When have you fallen into a pattern of binary thinking about others? When have you "Other-ed" someone? How did it prevent you from showing God's inclusive love?
- When has our congregation fallen into a pattern of binary thinking about others?
- What efforts could be taken so that this doesn't happen?

Beloved, won't you pray for God's help to reveal God's love inclusively for each of us and for all of us.



Here are some "expert" suggestion on how to make a "Brand" work for a church:

- Good branding in your church is more than a good feeling: It's not only our job to help connect with people on an emotional level, but it is truly our job to help people connect on a spiritual level. Good branding goes past the emotion and truly brings color to someone's life in a spiritual way.
- 2) **Complexity to simplicity:** It's very easy to make things complex, but you have to work very hard to make things simple. If you had to define your ministry in one word, could you do it?
- 3) **Design consistency:** If you don't stay consistent, you might as well tell your audience you really don't know what you're doing.
- 4) **Be relevant:** This does not mean play Lady Gaga in your church because she's the most followed person on Twitter. Being relevant to your community may mean you teach them to be better parents or how to help out a neighbor.

- 5) **Great companies and brands tell stories:** God has given everyone a story. Every great story has a story of redemption, a story of grace. Tell your story, and then tell the greatest story.
- 6) It isn't about you: What does this all mean? Grasp what your community wants and needs, and you can become a great brand. What problems are you solving for your community? On a practical level? It's been too long since the church has asked this question.

If you want to make your brand successful, remove YOU from the center and put your focus on what your community's needs are. They are speaking louder than words. Through their art, their dance, their protests, their crimes.

Report from the Church Council About Our Ministry and our Future

Church Council met Wednesday, June 25 and made several important decisions about the future which will keep us moving forward! These include the confirmation of spending that the congregation approved at the June 1 meeting.

We wanted to let you know about these big steps forward asap!

 As of Sunday, October 5, 2014 our 10 am Sunday Worship will move to the new ministry center at 458 High Street, Medford. We will continue to worship there on Sundays at 10 am until further notice. We will begin a deliberate congregational conversation about worship and music models that are called out of our vision, but will not try to complete that over the summer. That



- conversation will consider both the worship hopes and expectations of our current members, and those of the people who we seek to do ministry with who are not yet here; and we will prioritize the needs and preferences of those who are not yet here.
- Church Council approved a partnership arrangement with Rev. Tom Hathaway for a 5 Month
 "Consulting Contract" (July, Sept-Dec, 2014) to work with our congregation in three ministries areas.
 These include in partnership with North Prospect Union a) new, web based faith formation ministry;
 b) youth ministry and c) Mission and Justice Ministries. The proposal, Tom's CV/Statement on

- Church council affirmed initial spending for Construction and Furnishings for the church offices and ministry center in the amount of \$25,000.00. The design of the secure, air conditioned and handicap accessible space includes: a small office for the pastor, a church office, a small hospitality area with refrigerator and microwave, a handicap accessible restroom, a large basement storage area and a multipurpose meeting/gathering space which will seat 40 in cushioned "church chairs". Further proposals are forthcoming for the costs associated with high quality Audio Visual System, Keyboard for worship, exterior signage and computer and other electronic upgrades. Watch for an invitation in mid July to take a field trip to the new digs!!

- Church council commissioned a By Law Team to address a new church organizational model and a complete revision of our bylaws—with the objective of being completed by Sept 1 and voted upon at a meeting of the governing body on Sept. 14. 2014.
- Church Council was advised that the sale of the building is progressing and is still scheduled to complete on September 30, 2014.

CWS School Kits for Kids—Service Project

Ice Cream Social & Family Networking for

"Faith Formation at Home"

Church World Services is in need of School Kits for children around the world. School Kits give children in impoverished schools, refugee camps, or other difficult settings some of the basic tools for learning.



We are planning our first new ministry center moment during the first week of school! We will invite families all over Medford to collect items for CWS School Kits and ask them to bring their donations to our ministry center over the course of an afternoon where kids will have a chance to "build a kit", craft a note to include in the kit (we will send them to CWS); have their own backpacks, laptops, tablets and school year blessed and share in an 'Ice Cream Social'.

We will use the opportunity to network and connect with families and share our Faith Formation in the Home ministry/Web Site based offering.

Check out more details about the School Kit packing and shipping.

To assemble a CWS School Kit you will need:

- One pair of blunt metal scissors (rounded tip)
- Three 70-count spiral notebooks or notebooks totaling 200-210 pages (no loose-leaf or filler paper)
- One 30-centimeter ruler (12")
- One hand-held pencil sharpener
- One large eraser
- Six new pencils with erasers
- One box of 24 crayons (only 24)
- One 12" x 14" to 14" x 17" finished size cotton or lightweight canvas bag with cloth handles.
 (Please, no reusable shopping bags or backpacks.)
- Pack all items inside the cloth bag (pattern for bag is on website)

We will also need to raise the \$ 2.00 per kit for shipping to send along to CWS!

Note this Urgent Appeal issued in June: "With the latest shipment of CWS School Kits to our partner IOCC in response to the Syrian refugee crisis, CWS is now down to about 60 cartons of School Kits at the New Windsor Warehouse and 120 cartons at the warehouse in Ferncliff. We need to replenish these supplies immediately. In the case of Syria, IOCC supports one of the largest established networks to deliver life-saving humanitarian aid inside Syria, where more than 9.3 million people are currently in need of assistance. In November 2013, some 3,000 CWS School Kits were shipped for distribution in Syria. CWS School Kits include some of the basic necessities for learning, including notebooks, pencils and crayons. These kits help children return to normalcy faster, helping them avoid the long-term effects of trauma."



The Lakota Sewing Circle in So. Dakota has donated a Star Quilt for us to raffle. The purpose of the raffle is raise funds to cover the shipping costs of all the sewing materials generously given and to be sent to the Pine Ridge Fund.
